Most of our Under 14 side were involved in Balwyn's Hatch Shield effort during January with varying degrees of success. Similar results were achieved in ESCCA inter-zone games and an abandoned inter-association match on Australia Day. Alan Kosky performed creditably with the bat.

Frank Caldwell captained the B zone Under 16 team in an unsuccessful encounter with A zone on January 21 and 28. Craig Rowbotham went beserk with the bat and Dave Brodtmann even had a bowl.

You may have noticed that a certain John Tamblyn has been performing well in the firsts over the past few weeks. A few of you might mutter, "and about time too". John came back to us last season accompanied by a promising future. That future is now the present.

A grade's score of 327 in the last match prompted some interest in large totals scored in the club's history. A quick look through some old score books found the following:

- *In 1975/76 our C2 team scored 329 against Blackburn Bapts. Trevor Baxter made 85, and Robert Coombs, batting at no.10, scored 62 n.c.
- *NBMCC Under 16's totalled 6/340 on the first morning of the 1970/71 Semi-Final. Peter Felstead made 105, and the McKenzies each scored a half-century.
- *Russell Davison contributed an unbeaten 107 to B1's 345 in 1968/69. John Harris and "Jack" Vandenberg added 90 and 96 respectively
- *In a match against Kerrimuir in the 1967/68 season, our Under 16's made 358, largely due to an innings of 201 by Trevor Sanders. A certain E. Walsh took 3/117.
- *A few years later, 1969/70, B1 grade amassed 6/358 against Mont Albert. Geoff Harris 103, Ron Blake 102, Trevor Tombs 0.
- *In the 1976/77 Cemi-Final, our C2 team was set 347 by Blackburn Bapts. -a sizeable task in any match, let alone a Semi-Final. However an opening stand of 138 between Richard Stone and Michael Walsh and a fifth-wicket partnership of 108 between Phil Chapman and Ian Toogood took the final total to 5/368. Stone 140, Chapman 62, Toogood 58, Walsh 50.
- *The same team scored 330 two weeks later to win the Grand Final. Phil Chapman (101 ret.) and Michael Walsh (78) again guided the team to victory.
-Some other interesting facts discovered during our search through the archives included:
 - *.. young Russell Davison, playing for NBMCC Under 16's in 1960/61, bowled 4 overs for 2/72. Russell's last over went like this... 4 6 0 4 6 6 6 6.
 - *The best all-round performance in a single season in the history of the club was performed by Russell Davison in 1966/67 B2's premiership year. Russell took 60 wickets at 9.88 and scored 562 runs.
 - *The best bowling performance we could find was by Ian McKenzie, (a famous name in NBMCC history) against St.Aidans when captain of our Under 14's. Macca took 7/4 from six overs, including a hat-trick and four wickets in five balls. St.Aidans were dismissed for 20, of which there were 11 extras.

Twilight Report...in detail

The sting of defeat still present in mind, the Twilight team set out to destroy Camberwell Uniting last Wednesday. Trevor Tombs, called to play his first evening match, and Neil Johnston, fresh from his wicket-taking spree on Saturday, added strength to the slightly suspect eleven.

Brew, an experienced Twilight competitor, was placed in command and justified his position by winning the toss and opening the innings with Dick. Eleven runs later, both had left the field of play. (Had they been payed to play those strokes?). The old firm of Smith and Chanter applied their years of accumulated cricketing knowledge to take the score to 52. Smith, the more adventurous of the two, was compulsorily retired at 28 and new-comer Tombs joined the patient Welshman. Trevor had a few problems adapting to the style of play, but was just finding touch when desmissed at 16, and the team total at 79.

Michael Walsh came and went amidst a whirlwind of willow for the addition of no runs whatsoever. David Oswin, who practises his batting against the bowling of Junior wicket-keepers, had trouble with the Senior attack and only managed a few. Brew gave the order "Death or Glory", and Byrney chose the latter as he drove a quick 13. Tony finally reached the magic 25, but with a few minutes remaining was involved in a flurry of "Yes", "No" and "Wait". Johnno and Tony left the field, both believing that they were run-out. Dick, who was umpiring at the time, was too busy rebuilding the wicket to give a decision, so Tony sent Neil back and unselfishly headed for the pavilion. As he did, some of the opposition questioned the verdict.

Tony explained the situation, saying, "Listen mate. I'm out. Do you want to make something of it?" No one did, so he was out. The younger Stone and Walsh did little to increase the total and Brew declared at 9/114 soon after the last ball of the innings. Astute captaincy indeed.

Trevor Tombs and Michael Walsh, we ring his Marlon Brando cut-off T-shirt opened with the new (oops - old) ball and had immediate success completing their three overs with 2/17 and 1/13 respectively. Brew and Robby picked up catches off Trev and Wal scattered the stumps with his final delivery. 3 for 33 and Johnno was warming up, but Brew decided on Robby Walsh and Tony. Both broke through in their second overs, Tony relocating the bails and Penguin taking a diving slips catch at deep cover. Camberwell were 5/52 and the game was evenly poised with just over half the allotted overs gone. The fielding was fairly tight, with a few major exceptions, costing a critical run-out and several boundaries Smith and Wal were displaying some particularly effective throwing arms. Tony finished his spell with 1/23 and Brew, showing great foresight, decided to save Robby's final over until later. Johnno's arm was swingin wildly about his head, but Byrney was favoured to save the [ame. The sixth wicket partnership was building considerably and the tension was mounting, but Brew stayed cool. He asked his bespecatcled pseudo-cousin for one over, and swung Chris to the other end. Three overs remaining and thirty four runs required with four wickets in hand. Accurate bowling was required, but Byrney had trouble with his length, and 12 runs were taken from his second over. Robby bowled his last over on the spot, but the batsmen were hitting the ball hard and took 13 runs.

One over to go, nine runs and still four wickets intact. Brew thought carefully and looked around the field for inspiration. Could he trust Byrney? Could Dick possibly bowl an over for less than nine runs? Would Penguin bowl nine no-balls? Could Smith take four wickets? Johnno, the eternal optimist, placed himself prominently in Brew's vision, but the Captain was blind to such foolishness. Putting faith in his old friend, Brew gave the ball to Chris and the field moved toward the boundary. The final act was ready for staging.

A single from each of the first two balls brought up the 50 partnership for the sixth wicket. The third ball was skied to deep mid-off, some hundred or so feet above Tony Chanter, who positioned himself perfectly to hold the catch with teeth gritted. Five balls, seven runs. The next delivery beat the bat with sheer pace, the following ball rapped the batsman's pads and a leg bye was taken. Three deliveries to come and Byrney was reaching Thommo-like velocity. A single from the sixth ball and a bye to the keeper from the seventh. One ball to come, just four runs needed. An edge, a mis-hit or even an error by the keeper could have won it for Camberwell. Byrney tore in for the final delivery and the bat swung wildly. The ball flew towards the backward square leg boundary and the whole legside field chased it. Robby picked it up a yard inside the flags, eturned it to Brew as the batsmen completed the second run. Brew held the ball at the stumps and dared them to run for a third. They didn't, and it was all over, with eleven of the NBMCC team believing they had won the game single-handedly.

2. 2. 2/s

Today is a sad day in the history of the NBMCC. One of our club's stalwarts is playing what may or may not be his last game with us. Certainly, this round will mark a temporary end to a fine cricketing career with the club. Edward 'Ed' Irons is moving to Adelaide to further extend his intellectual potential at a University level. In his 8 or 9 seasons Ed has proven himself a valuable player, a respected teammanager, a bespectacled committee member, and more recently an astute vice-captain. His performances on the field speak for themselves. Due to an accident at the State Library we only have complete records of his illustrious career dating from 1974/75. During the past four seasons Ed has bowled 560 overs forthe second XI and has taken 147 wickets at a cost of 2082 runs. His best individual performances have included 8/25, (9/10/76) 8/43 (14/12/74) and 7/21 (1/10/77). Ed's achievements with the bat during this period have been equally remarkable. In 43 hands, he has ammassed a mammoth 207 runs at 6.90. Ed has always maintained that batting fame has been unjustly denied him, and if he comes back it will be as a batsman. Good luck Ed, and may your inswinger never swing out.
